New Hire Rates

As many in the community should be aware, the cost of electricity has risen dramatically over the last 12 months and along with other increases in running costs, the Village Hall Management Committee have had to take the difficult decision to increase the rates for hire for the hall.

The new rates are as follows:

1) **Clubs and Society rate** Previous rate: £6 per hour New rate: £8 per hour Note: this is the first increase since April 2010.

2) **Public events & private hire**: Previous rate: £10 per hour New Rate: £12 per hour For events needing extra time to set up we will offer a setup rate of £8 per hour.

The correct contact methods to report incidents to Northamptonshire Police for reference.

Report it Report a non-emergency minor crime in around 15 minutes using the online form within our website – https://www.northants.police.uk The online form is significantly less time consuming than phoning 101.

Only call 999 in an emergency where there is a danger to life, or a crime in progress.

When to call 101 You should call 101 when it is less urgent than 999 but you need to report crime or disorder. For example:

- Your car has been stolen
- Your property has been damaged
- You wish to report drug dealing
- To report a minor traffic accident
- To speak to the police about a general enquiry

Jean Mackaness

My Mother lived in Weston for nearly 50 years having moved here with Michael, her husband, a Chartered Surveyor; Christopher, my brother; and myself. She was a respected showing judge and highly accomplished equestrian who died on 5 February, aged 97. She was born in Dulwich, London, in 1926, she grew up in Salisbury, Wiltshire, where she attended the Godolphin School. Her mother, Irene, owned a riding school, and this is where Jean's' passion for horses began. She enjoyed eventing with her gelding Sandy Boy and based herself in Ireland as she prepared for the 1953 Badminton Horse Trials, but Sandy went lame however, the following year they were 10th at Badminton, and in 1955 they competed at the European Championships at Windsor where they finished in the top half of the field and then again competed at Badminton in 1956. In between these events, Jean and Sandy Boy were won or were placed in many other events including Horse of the Year Show. She finally competed in her last major three-day event in 1964 at Burghley Horse Trials after the birth of her children.

Mum met my father Michael, a farmer's son and point-to-point jockey. They were married in 1955, and Chris was born in 1957 and me a bit later. Mum later gave up eventing and took up judging, firstly ridden hunters and then ponies. Her judging appointments took her all over the UK, Ireland, Australia, and New Zealand, for organisations including Ponies UK and the British Show Pony Society. She was on BSPS panel for more than 40 years and retired from judging at the 2014 Horse of the Year Show, aged 88. She was also a British Horse Society (BHS) and Pony Club instructor and taught her sons and four grandchildren to ride. Mum had a passion for hunting and dressage, and she continued to ride into her 80s and was the family "stable manager and instructor" for all those years down at Milthorpe Meadow. She loved the flower show, open gardens, dinner at the Crown pub and village activities.

"Jean was a wonderful person, who lived a full and rich life. She faced many challenges and difficulties, but she never gave up. She was an inspiration to us all determined, strong but also very kind," said a friend of our family.

She loved living in this village and thought that the community spirit was wonderful. She was very much a country person who would watch the passing of the seasons and wildlife with great pleasure. The village gave her friendship and support after my father died and she never wanted to move. It was only the bad fall she had trying to pick up a plastic plant pot that had the disastrous consequences that she had to leave the village for lengthy spells in hospital. We managed to enjoy some lovely family time together in between these hospital visits including a fun family Christmas in 2022 but she succumbed to illness again and died at Duncote Hall on 5th February 2024.

Thank you to all those who sent their best wishes and also to those who attended her Memorial Service.

Thank you to all those in Grove Lane who tended to Mum whilst waiting for hours in the bad weather for an ambulance on that fateful October day.

A message from our Parish Church of St Mary & St Peter

All properties (and therefore residents) of our parish will have received and (hopefully read) a short leaflet regarding the on-going financial needs of our local church and which is asking for your help to keep our church operating and open. If you didn't receive one - blame our treasurer/postman Clive! - a copy will be attached to a forthcoming Newsletter Update email.

This is an important issue for us all because the building is a central, valuable and historic part of our community.

We really hope that you will appreciate that our request is sent with the best intention and that you are then able to find a way, however small or large, to support and help maintain our historic building, not just for today but for future generations.

We have good news regarding the repair of the Chancel east wall! We have so far received £4,250 in grants from 3 providers and anticipate another grant from the Northamptonshire Historic Churches Trust, who visited our church this week to consider our application and the work required. Their view was very positive and we should hear by mid-April, fingers crossed! However, even better news - we are already in a position to start the work, given additional funds previously set aside from our own resources and the tremendous financial support offered by the Friends of Lois Weedon Church. We expect the work to begin imminently, using one of our local resident builders. Watch out for the scaffolding!

Finally, we are always looking for helpers to clean the church (a bit of polishing, dusting and vacuuming etc) and if you have a couple of hours to spare, no more than once a month and would like to volunteer, then please contact Clive Johnson (clivetjohnson@gmail.com) who will pass your details on to a member of the Church Council who looks after the rota.

Parish Council

Edited notes from the Parish Council meeting held on **January 29th 2024** in the Village Hall. Full minutes of council meetings are posted on the Village Notice Boards and on the Parish Council website. If anyone would like more information on any matter, please contact the Clerk, Ken Power.

Finance Matters: Accounts 2023/24 to-date and budget performance to date were reviewed and approved. It was noted that a claim will be submitted to HMRC for approximately £127.

Interim Audit 2023 / 2024

The council approved the successful NCALC Interim Audit conducted on 18th January.

2024 / 2025 Budget and Precept - The proposed budget and precept for the next financial next year was unanimously approved. The parish precept for 2024 / 2025 will be unchanged at £8000.00.

Payments were approved for Clerk's salary and expenses, NPower (electricity supply for street lights), E.ON (Street-lighting maintenance), NCALC (training), P. Smith (Defibrillator maintenance)

Planning Matters

Application 2023/8035/OUT. Land west of Ashwell Road, Weedon Lois. One self-build dwelling. **Supported.** Application 2024/0263/TCA. 25, High Street, Weston. Application to fell one Lawson Cypress tree. **Supported.**

Parish Council Website.

Our website service provider for many years, 2Commune, is no longer able to support the website. Cllr. Smith will liaise with Frank Hunter and report back to the council with a recommendation for a replacement provider before the next meeting.

Electricity Supply

Following a significant increase in charges levied by the current supplier, Npower, the Clerk has investigated possible alternative suppliers through NCALC and its partnership with Clear Utility Solutions. The best alternative was only £6.00 per year cheaper, so the council has decided to remain with Npower. If Npower costs increase again, the Clerk will again look at possible alternatives.

Millennium Field

The contract under which the Parish Council rents the field from the Horticultural Society expires in March. The Parish Council is continuing to discuss with the Society future arrangements for use and maintenance of the field.

Castle Mound

Members of the public, Mrs. Iris Gregory and Mr. Mike Streten praised the appearance and accessibility of the Mound since the work done by Cllr. Elkington. They hoped that the council had a plan for keeping the site in its current excellent condition. Cllr. Elkington explained that a revised management plan, incorporating suggestions by Historic England, is being finalised to ensure this. The council is considering planting Spring flower bulbs on the Mound, and it was agreed that the school should be approached to ask if the children would like to help with planting.

AOB

- The councillors asked the Clerk to contact Eric Malcomson to congratulate him on being awarded the MBE, and to thank him and the team for all their work in installing broadband in the parish.
- Member of the public, Mike Streten explained his intention to borrow a speed gun from the police to discourage excessive speed through the villages. Volunteers who wish to help him with this should contact him at stretenmichael@yahoo.co.uk.

Rectory View

In this six-church benefice scuttling about from place to place is an occupational necessity and timings can be tricky. How long does it take, say, to get to Radstone from Lois Weedon on any particular day, given HS2 (and other) closures? I've found that I need to factor floods and horses as well as the road blocks into my calculations; there seem to be more floods and horses on the roads in South Northamptonshire than I'm used to over the river in Oxfordshire! And then there's the curious way in which Wappenham moves further east every week. Have you noticed?

The rain in the months since I arrived in the benefice has been truly apocalyptic, though I don't think it's my fault. Is this world-as-we-know-it-ending climate change? Or just South Northants? Either way, I imagine the wet is causing serious difficulties for our farmers, so spare a thought or a prayer for them. And then there is the Rectory Garden – acres of it, it seems – now beginning, with all the water, to come forth in abundance and splendour and terrifying me as to how I am meant to tame it. The Diocese did a good job of slashing and hacking before I came but I think it's over to me now. What would you think about a Quiet Garden at the Rectory that you could come to for some peace, maybe with a labyrinth to walk, if you felt like it – and no obligation to take a lawnmower to the vegetation?

I do seriously wonder whether an open Rectory Garden could become a community asset. Maybe our school would like to be involved in its development. It's been a great delight for me to start taking assemblies at the school and so to begin to become part of the school community. The school will be a part of our Holy Week celebrations at the Church. They will come to the Church for a pre-Thursday-Maundy ceremony at 9.30am on Wednesday 27th March (ah, the timings! I have to be in Peterborough for the Maundy ceremony on the Thursday itself).) That occasion will follow the Reflections service in the Church on Tuesday 26th March at 7.00 pm with the Benefice Choir. Then on Good Friday (29th March) there will be a service at 1.00pm. On Easter Day, 31st March we shall celebrate the Resurrection at 9.30am. If that's a bit late for you, do join us at Radstone at 6.00am for a Dawn Celebration (get your timing right – the clocks go forward!) or even earlier at 9.00pm on Saturday 30th for the Vigil and First Eucharist of Easter at Plumpton Church.

It would be great to see you in Church over the Easter period (floods and horses permitting) but do feel free to be in touch anytime.
