Rectory View

Much as I have enjoyed my few months in the Astwell Benefice and my occupancy of the Lois Weedon Rectory, I may shortly be on my way out.

My possible exit will occur for one of the three following reasons:

- 1. I may perish on the pilgrimage round the Astwell Benefice on 19th May, Whitsun or Pentecost. It's an 18 mile + circuit of the seven churches, a revival of an ancient Astwell tradition. 18 miles is not a distance I often walk in a day and who knows whether the body will take it. But don't let me put you off: everyone knows that walking, if it doesn't kill you, is very good for you in various ways and if the pilgrimage kills me, your being an eyewitness to that will give you a tale to tell for years to come. We start at 8.00am at Lois Weedon Church but if you want to catch up with us later, please ask me for a timetable of where we shall be when. The Communion service for the Benefice during the pilgrimage will be at Syresham at 11.15, with a Baptism fittingly for a day on which we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit on the Church.
- 2. I may take the view that the eye-watering cost of maintaining the Rectory Garden is not something I'm prepared to pay receiving the quotation nearly gave me a heart attack. 'Mow it yourself,' you say to which I reply: 'See above under 1 and, besides, I do have another job!' I've been researching alternatives to mowing and it's been fascinating to find out what you have to do, bureaucracy-wise to keep a pig, for instance and to take it for a walk. So, before I perhaps go after the licenses required to keep and walk pigs, I'd like to consult you as to whether a pig walking regularly from the Rectory to, say, the Chapel in Weston and back would be good for the village. Maybe you would like to do a bit of pig-walking. Let me know.
- 3. Crow incursion. As you can see from 2 above, I'm not averse to an embrace of the animal creation. I'm not St Francis, though, and I do draw a line at crows coming down the Rectory chimney and arriving, unbidden, in the sitting-room. I expect most of us find birds in the house unnerving and so it was for me on 2nd May. Woken by sounds behind the bedroom wall, I turned over in bed and tried to ignore them. But they didn't stop and there was undeniably an issue in the chimney; maybe rodents, maybe birds. My first decision was to prevent any access to the sitting room from the chimney by blocking an alarming hole in the hearth screen; any bird could find its own way out. Or not. And the 'or not' stirred my pity lest the thing *couldn't* find its own way out (and how do dead birds in chimneys smell?), so I unblocked the hole and went off to Choir practice, taking care to close the sitting room door to avoid having to chase a bird all around the Rectory should one appear. On my return, I looked in on the sitting room and there it was a sleek, slightly reptilian crow. After a bit of a scuffle I got hold of it (disgusting!) and chucked it out and off it flew. But if this happens again (and if I survive the pilgrimage and the pig), I'm off!

But whether I'm off or not, there will from June onwards be a third service each month at our Church. So you're very welcome at 9.30am on the 2nd, 3rd and 4th Sundays of the month. And, indeed, in June we also have our Patronal Festival 0n the 5th Sunday (30th) at 10.00am. Do come!
