

#### **News from the Rectory**

This time of the year, I am reminded of that beautiful poem by John Keats – To Autumn. It begins:

Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness, Close bosom-friend of the maturing sun;

The poem then continues to celebrate all of the signs and sounds of autumn, the leaves falling, the fruit in the hedgerows and apples on the trees, the sound of the robin singing – often the only bird you hear in autumn and through into winter. Autumn feels like a time to say goodbye – goodbye to the green of summer, the warmth of the sun, the flowers and bird song – and often to repeat our goodbyes to those we have loved and lost, through our season of remembrance at the beginning of November. On All Souls, on the 2<sup>nd</sup> November we remembered those who have died and we continue to miss, then on Remembrance Sunday we honoured those who died in war.

This year I will be saying goodbye to my fulltime ministry as a parish priest and moving on to retirement and, no doubt, a new life of a slightly gentler service to the Lord. So, it is a time of memories and goodbyes for me also. Although my time here in the Astwell Benefice has been short, I have enjoyed living here and serving you all as your parish priest. However, my body (and my mind!) is telling me it is time to slow down – the last few years have been very stressful; losing my husband at the start of Covid, moving home and jobs and dealing with all the issues around continuing a Christian presence during the lockdowns and afterwards, and I am finding it very difficult to maintain the full-on rate of work that is involved with running a Benefice of 5 parishes. So, I shall be leaving at the end of November and retiring to my home in Northumberland for a rest.

My last Sunday is on Advent Sunday  $-27^{th}$  November, where I will have two final services, a 10am Benefice Service at Helmdon and a 6pm Advent Carols Service at Lois Weedon. It is actually a fitting Sunday to end fulltime ministry as it marks the beginning of the new church year - when we look forward to remembering the birth of Jesus at Christmas. So a good time for new beginnings for me and the churches here in the Benefice.

God bless and good wishes to you all for the new chapter in the church life in this Benefice.

#### **Update from Canons Ashby**

Apologies for the slightly late updates. It has been all hands on deck behind the scenes getting the house ready for Christmas. I'm going to wish you all a very Merry Christmas for the season ahead now, as no doubt it will be here before we know it!

Below is a brief overview from our House and Collections Manager Ellie about the latest conservation work from the house.

During November, the house team and conservators have been able to take a look at a project we have been working on for a while, namely conserving and protecting the Great Hall floor which is gradually sinking. There are a number of options; the current one is to trial a grouting solution in a small area. Our advisors believe that we will ultimately have to relay the slabs, but the West Northamptonshire Council and Historic England Heritage Officers (from whom we need planning permission) want to make sure we've tried less invasive treatment first.

After this work has been carried out, we'll monitor the footfall and how well the repairs are holding. If they're successful, we'll look to roll this treatment out in all of the affected areas, if not we'll apply for planning permission to lift the slabs and reinstate a stable substrate below.

Assessment of the mould in the cellars below also continues. We're carrying out regular monitoring to ascertain whether the area is getting damper, drier or staying the same. Advice on how to remove the algae that's already there is the next step, and then we can monitor whether it returns. You may have noticed that we're keeping the door to the Kitchen and to the Pebble Court open during the day to increase airflow. We're also commissioning a new door from the cellar to the Pebble Court with ventilation to permanently improve the conditions in the cellar.

Keep an eye on our social media over the coming months, and if we can, we will share some images and updates.
