

#### **Rectory View**

As we move into the darker days of Autumn and Winter, we carry some bright memories.

It was lovely to welcome Arabella Phipps into Christ's Church at her baptism – and very good that nothing untoward happened with what I think of as a rather dodgy (possibly potentially lethal) font cover mechanism!

Either side of that came fine Harvest celebrations in Village Hall and Church. The Harvest Supper was very special with a wonderful meal, live music and video of previous entertainments (for outsider me, that dip into the past was most illuminating). The Hall was packed and a serious sum was raised for the Church, for which thanks to everyone there. A particular thanks to the too-many-to-name cooks and entertainers. The Church Harvest Festival service was well-attended and it was good, as always, to welcome the School to St Mary and St Peter's for their Festival too.

The School has been involved in a big project for the time around Remembrance Day. The children have made poppies that will be part of a display to be hung at the west end of the Church over the Remembrance period. I'm told there will be over 300 poppies, crocheted, knitted and of felt. This will make a huge impact on people as they come through from Weston. Many thanks – especially to Terry Tyler, Louise King and Joy Kirkham - but to others involved also for this splendid enhancement of our remembering those who have given their lives for their country in war. Do come to the Remembrance Service on 10<sup>th</sup> November; it begins at 10.50.

At the end of November, on 29<sup>th</sup>, Bishop Debbie, from distant Peterborough, is visiting Brackley Deanery. Her visit begins in Lois Weedon with a 10.00am Confirmation service at which she will also bless the restored east window in the Church. If you'd like to meet her, you'd be most welcome at the service or to come along after, at about 10.45am.

Special things happening in December include a Benefice Advent Carol Service in the church on 1<sup>st</sup> at 6pm and a Christmas Carol Service on Thursday 19<sup>th</sup> December at 5.30 pm. There are Christmas Carols in Weston Chapel at 10.30am on 22<sup>nd</sup>. Then there's Midnight Mass in church on Christmas Eve beginning at 11.30pm. Nothing on Christmas morning in our church but there are services elsewhere in the Benefice, of course. Do let me know if next year you would like a Christmas morning service at Lois Weeedon.

There's also a Wedding Blessing in the church on 5<sup>th</sup> December at 2.30 and I think Lucy and James would be delighted if you felt like gate-crashing that! I gather there will be mulled wine and mince pies, some carols and a general Christmassy feel.

Another occasion, to which you are all invited, is *Inspiration for the Future*, a discussion about the future of the Astwell Benefice, which will happen in Weston Chapel on the morning of Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> December starting at 9.30. We'd love to hear from people, especially those who don't come regularly to Church, about what they think the parish and the benefice should be attempting as 2024 passes into 2025.

One thing we shall be attempting is the Astwell Festival, which will run from Friday 30<sup>th</sup> May 2025 to June 8<sup>th</sup>. This will involve drama, art and craft workshops, music, sport, children's book events, worship, etc. and will raise money for children's charities. Do let me or Frank Hunter know if you'd like to be involved. Besides the money-raising, the Festival is intended to demonstrate that rural benefices such as Astwell can do big things for their communities and beyond and therefore need to be enthusiastically supported by the diocese rather than regarded as regrettable financial burdens. (And thanks to your generosity, and that of others elsewhere in benefice, we shall not this year be a burden to the diocese because we shall pay our share in full.)

So a lot going on and I'm sorry for ever having given the false impression that I might want to get away from it all. I absolutely don't want that and expect to be around for some years yet (if spared). I'd love to discuss with anyone who'd like to have a conversation whatever you'd like to talk about relating to the church. A labyrinth, herb garden and beehives at the Rectory, perhaps? – and surely someone wants to take further the question of pig-walking. I'll be a little disappointed if nobody responds on that one. But only a little.

#### A message of thanks from the Lois Weedon Parochial Church Council for St Mary & St Peter

As we draw towards the end of the year, we wanted to tell you how your generous gifts, donations and support for fund raising events throughout 2024 have helped to strengthen our finances and put us in a better position, ready for 2025.

In April this year, you may recall that we embarked on a fund-raising mission to help with the on-going and day to day financial needs of our parish church. We were overjoyed with your response!

From that request, we received one-off donations totalling more than £1,000, and individual increases and additional regular giving amounting to more than £120 per month. We now also receive a regular monthly donation from ABbA (Tove Valley Broadband) in recognition of their equipment being sited on the church tower.

Turning now to fund raising events, including the monthly Village Coffee Mornings, a summer garden party, an afternoon tea party and the Harvest Supper evening, your support has contributed £3,155.21 to church funds so far this year. We are sure that you'll be pleased to learn that this amount has been 'ring-fenced' and added to our Restoration & Fabric fund for use solely on the repair and maintenance of the building.

In September, the significant repair to the Chancel East wall was completed. Scaffolding has been removed and it is lovely to see the window in all its glory again! We received grants and individual donations totalling £10,800 plus £2,500 VAT refund to help pay for the repair and all associated costs totalling £15,400. We are especially grateful for the individual grants from 4 organisations, as well as the strong financial support from The Friends of Lois Weedon Church. Some additional but minor works are now being undertaken to repair some of the glass and mortar fixings within the chancel window, which will then fully weatherproof and secure the lead frames.

We expect to reach 100% of our target Parish Share this year, which is a phenomenal achievement when compared to only reaching 50% of the same target in 2023. You have helped us to make a difference! Indeed, the whole Benefice is on track to meet its full target in 2024.

Going forward, given that we are currently able to cover our day-to-day general expenses, we do hope in the new year to be able to share some financial gifts from our operating fund to other local and/or national charities. This has always been a key mission of ours and we are glad that through your help we are once again able to do this. We will let you know the details once completed.

Overall, our financial position is much improved compared to the start of the year and we are definitely on the right road. But as always, that road has many potholes and there is more to be done.

We currently face a new challenge where a 3-metre section of the high parapet above the north wall has collapsed inwards to the roof. This will require repair/rebuild and we are in the process of obtaining quotes before looking at funding options. We also want to look at fixing the significant damp areas within the church before then moving on to redecoration in 2025. Much is to be done and we give thanks to every one of you that continue to support your church.

Once again, thank you! And we take this opportunity to wish you, your families and your friends a very happy Christmas and 2025!

#### **Parish Council**

Here is a summary of the most recent Parish Council meeting held on **October 15**<sup>th</sup> in the Village Hall. The meeting was attended by 5councillors, the Clerk, West Northants Councilor, Charles Manners and several members of the public. Full minutes of council meetings are posted on the Village Notice Boards and on the Parish Council website. If anyone would like more on any matter, please contact the Clerk, Ken Power.

#### Cllr Charles Manners (WNC) Cllr. Manners gave an up-date on WNC matters:

- Northampton market is re-opening after renovation.
- Social services care for adults and children is putting pressure on WNC finance. Of WNC's budget of £400m, 60% is consumed by social services care. Adult care is overspent by £9m and children's by £3-4m.
- The Local Plan has been delayed by the election of the new government. It needs to be ready by the end of 2025
- The government wishes to devolve more power to the regions. There is a proposal to link West Northants with North Northants, Milton Keynes and Bedfordshire.

**Finance Matters**: The accounts 2024 / 2025 to date and progress against budget were reviewed and approved. It was noted that both tranches of the precept had been received and that VAT claims are up to date.

Under HMRC rules no further claim can be made until the amount to be claimed exceeds £100.00.

**Payments** were approved for CGM (Churchyard mowing and Millennium Field mowing), Clerk's salary and expenses, E.ON (Street lighting maintenance), Npower (Electricity Supply for street lighting in Milthorpe)

#### **Planning Matters:**

- Application 2024/4433/PA. Land south of Banbury Lane, Weston. Prior approval for conversion of an existing agricultural building to a single dwelling. Support
- Application 2024/4793/TPO. Tree work at The Old Manse, High Street, Weston. Support.

#### **Correspondence:**

• Email from **Homestart** requesting financial support. It was agreed that a charitable donation of this kind would be outside the council's remit.

#### Millennium Field.

The Chairman thanked all those who responded to the recent survey about the future of the field with positive and constructive comments. Given the strong local support in the survey and petition for maintaining the Millennium Field as a public amenity, with support from the Parish Council, it was agreed that the council will propose to the Horticultural Society the following new arrangement:

- A new agreement backdated to the expiry date of the old contract on 1st March 2024.
- The PC to pay rent of £535.00 per year, fixed for 5 years.
- The PC to continue to pay for mowing of the field, but no other maintenance.
- Public liability insurance for the field will be covered by the council's insurance policy, so it will not be necessary for the Horticultural Society to pay for insurance cover.
- The agreement to be reviewed after 5 years.
- The Horticultural Society will arrange for a new lease to be drawn up. It was further agreed that a Millennium Field Committee should be set up, with representatives from the council and the Horticultural Society, and others from the community

**Castle Mound** - It was agreed It was agreed that Cllr. Elkington will arrange the purchase of bulbs at a cost of up to £300.00. A date will be agreed with St. Loys school for the children to help with planting.

#### **AOB**

- Cllr. Sheppard suggested that a war memorial plaque or bench could be set up on the Millennium Field.

  Representatives of the Horticultural Society said they would also be happy for this to be on the allotments. Cllr Sheppard will investigate the possibilities.
- Ashley Cartwright asked if May Day will be brought back. Cllr. Smith confirmed that there will be a May Day celebration again on 6<sup>th</sup> May 2025.
- Clive Johnson expressed concern about the weeds on Ladies Walk and the condition of the tarmac. Cllr.
   Elkington regularly sprays the weeds and moss and will continue to do so. He has inspected the path and reported that there currently appear to be no trip hazards.
- Clive Johnson asked about who owns, and is responsible for maintaining, the extension graveyard. Since the meeting, Cllr. Sheppard has investigated and established that the land belongs to the Diocese of Peterborough.
- The PCC is concerned about the quality of mowing and clearing of grass cuttings in both churchyards. Cllr. Elkington will arrange with CGM that they will be mowed regularly at 10-14 days intervals. It was agreed that it is not practical to collect and remove grass cuttings, but the visual impact of these will be less if mowing is more frequent.
- Cllr. Brough announced his intention to resign from the Parish Council after the November meeting because of
  work commitments. Cllr. Elkington thanked him for his service to the council and announced that the council
  would welcome applications from potential new councillors.
