#### **Parish Council**

Here is a summary of the most recent Parish Council meeting held on **September 25**<sup>th</sup> in the Village Hall. The meeting was attended by 5 councillors, the Clerk and 2 members of the public. Full minutes of council meetings are posted on the Village Notice Boards and on the Parish Council website. If anyone would like more on any matter, please contact the Clerk, Ken Power.

**Finance Matters:** Accounts 2023/24 to-date and budget performance to date were reviewed and approved It was noted that the second tranche of the precept was due and the bank balance was healthy and a recent claim for repayment of £742.00 VAT had been received

**2022 / 2023 Internal Audit Report:** NCALC have again refused to correct inaccuracies in last year's report. A new auditor has been appointed and the Council will take no further action.

**Payments** were approved for CGM (Churchyard mowing and Millennium Field mowing), Clerk's salary and expenses, Horticultural Society (Rent of Millennium Field)

Planning Matters: Three planning applications were presented

- WNS/2023/6279/FULL: 12, Milthorpe, Weedon Lois NN12 8PP. Supported.
- WNS/2023/6284/FULL and 6285/LBC. Barn College Farm, Helmdon Road, Weston NN12 8PX: Supported
- WNS/ 2023/6349/FULL. Pear Tree Cottage, 6, Helmdon Road, Weston NN12 8PX: Supported.

Decisions taken after visits to both sites in Weston by Councillors and the Clerk on 14<sup>th</sup> September, including a meeting at Barn College Farm with representatives of Saville's, who act on behalf of the owners, All Souls College.

**William Blake House:** Correspondence had been received from a neighbour about noise from William Blake House. WBH responded quickly. The situation will be reviewed again at the November PC meeting.

**Castle Mound :** The tree work required by the last tree survey and agreed with Historic England has been done according to specification. Historic England has confirmed their second payment (£840.00) is being arranged.

A Maintenance Plan for control of ground cover and self-set saplings will be prepared. A copy of this will be reviewed with Historic England. Possible future developments were discussed with local residents present at the meeting.

There is again a problem with bubbling on the information lectern. The supplier has been contacted and has agreed to supply a much better-quality stove-baked panel at no extra cost to resolve the problem.

**Millennium Field.** The existing contract for the Parish Council's rental of the field from the Horticultural Society will expire in March 2024. It was agreed that a meeting should take place between the Council and the Horticultural Society to agree what should happen after that date.

**Churchyard Mowing:** At the previous meeting complaints were raised about the standard of the mowing. A meeting was held with the contractor and a new specification has been agreed.

**Next Meeting**: Monday 27<sup>th</sup> November, at 8.00 p.m. in the Village Hall, Weedon Lois.

#### Village Golf Day – Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> August 2023

That time of year came and sixteen intrepid golfers met for the third running of the Weston and Lois Weedon Village Golf day since its re-inception back in 2021.

Another year goes by and we are all one year older. It was once again held at Cherwell Edge Golf Club where over 25% of the competitors are members. You would have thought this would give them an advantage, hmm, perhaps not.

#### Clyde Burbidge – Opening Speech for the 81st Annual Horticultural Show

Good afternoon, I was first involved in the Horticultural Society in 1955. I had just come out of the army  $-11^{th}$  Hussars Cavalry; I was approached by Mr Neep, who was chairman of the Horticultural Society. Mr Neep was involved in just as about everything in the village back then -a little bit like a present day Paul Smith.

Mr Neep asked me if I would like to join the Horticultural Society Committee. He said that he had asked Frank Wills and they thought they needed a little bit of "young blood" on the committee. The current committee then included Ben Jones, Ernie Wheeler, George Causebrook, Freddie Wills and Walter Hinton – A very good committee/

We were very fortunate in the villages of Lois Weedon and Weston to have people living here who knew celebrities... C.H. Middleton, born in Weston, went to school in Lois Weedon School, and then went to Kew Gardens in London to further his education in horticulture. He was a friend of Jack Warner, Dixon of Dock Green, who opened the show at Weston Hall. Elsie & Doris Waters appeared regularly on a lunchtime programme that was broadcast on the radio every weekday called "Workers Playtime" and they were sisters of Jack Warner. Hermione Baddeley actress opened the show at Weston Hall. You may have never heard of Hermione Baddeley but if you did ever watch the series of "Upstairs Downstairs" on television, Hermione Baddeley was Mrs Bridges, the cook. Moira Shearer, ballerina of the "Red Shoes", married to Ludovic Kennedy, great friend of the Sitwell family, and as very great friend, even when Sacheveral died they both read poems in Lois Weedon Church. Well Moira Shearer opened the show at Lois Weedon House and in those days the show was in Lois Weedon House one year and Weston Hall the next. In my opinion when the show was in the gardens of the big houses it somehow had a different atmosphere. But that's just my opinion. Roddy Llewellyn came a week early which wasn't very much use for opening the show. Derek Nimmo arrived at Weston Hall in his chauffeur driven Rolls Royce and in my opinion was one of the best people we had to open the show. I thought he was marvellous. And then of course you've got Raine Spencer, known in the family as "Acid Raine", step-mother of Princess Diana, came to Weston Hall with Diana's father, Earl Spencer and opened the show at Weston Hall. And then of course you've got Barry Humphries, the great Dame Edna Everage who was another friend of the Sitwell family and opened the show on a couple of occasions at Weston Hall

And now I'm going to tell you a story. On several occasions I dressed up as Dame Edna for the Harvest Supper in the Village Hall in Lois Weedon. And I thought, now where can I borrow a bra. I daren't ask Jennie Liversidge. I'll go and see Hilda Wilkins, "Hilda, a very personal question to ask you, would you lend me a bra" - "Of course I would, my duck" she said and off she went and she came back with this black creation with a lace top to it – fitted perfectly. And on the Monday I took the bra back. "I've brought you bra back, Hilda" says I, "You keep it my duck, you need it more than I do." said Hilda

I still have the bra and no, I am not wearing it today. And with no further ado, I will declare the 2023 Lois Weedon & Weston Horticultural Show open"....
